MAPS 4

In December 2019, voters approved MAPS 4, which included 16 projects to address items ranging from sports and entertainment venues to help for those struggling with poverty and victims of abuse. Voters approved the measure by 72%. A voluntary advisory board will work with the City Council to plan and implement the projects with input from the public.

Land acquired for EMBARK Operations Center expansion. Bus stop upgrades in design, BRT alternatives analysis underway.

Sidewalks, Bike Lanes, Trails and Streetlights | \$87M

Sidewalks Phase I in pre-design. New streetlights will be purchased soon.

Beautification | \$30M

Master plan underway.

Homelessness | \$50M

Operator selected to provide different types of affordable housing throughout the city.

Paycom Center | \$115M

Phase I and portions of Phase II are underway. New seats, scoreboard, and elevator upgrades. Remainder paused because of plans for a new arena. \$70M will go toward the new arena.

Design underway.

Construction underway. MAPS 3 and 4 funding for a total of \$126M. Completion early 2025.

Diversion Hub | \$17M

Operator selected. Design underway.

Both facilities and Phase I of Neighborhood Connectivity maser plan are in design.

Freedom Center and Clara Luper Civil Rights Center | \$25M Operator selected.

Multipurpose Stadium | \$37M

Architect chosen. Operator selection process underway.





MAPS HISTORY

Former OKC Mayor Ron Norick conceived a plan to transform the city through a series of civic projects that would be built with a \$350 million sales tax initiative, and all projects would be built debt-free.

PAYING FOR MAPS

MAPS 4 is designed to raise \$978 million over eight years. The city tax rate will remain the same. MAPS 4 collections began April 1, 2020, when the Better Streets, Safe City temporary tax expired.

As with the previous MAPS projects, each is built debt-free as funds are collected.

To account for an economic downturn or lower-than-projected collections, MAPS is designed to anticipate modest increases each year.

MAPS 3 UPDATE


Other than a few projects still under construction and renovation, MAPS 3 is complete.

The Fairgrounds Coliseum, with funding from MAPS 3 and MAPS 4, will be completed in 2025.

The renovation of the historic Union Station in Scissortail Park began in the Fall 2023. It will include event spaces in former waiting rooms, meeting spaces, a kitchen and two bars, a visitor center, a cafe, a gift shop, and a history center.

Two Senior Health and Wellness Centers are under construction and set for completion in 2024.

SALES TAX RATE: 8.625%



City tax rate is 4.125%, the additional 4.5% goes to state and county. The 1¢ Temporary Sales Tax is for MAPS and other municipal projects.

ECONOMIC IMPACT

A study by the OKC Planning Department found that within a 3-block impact zone around the MAPS streetcar route, there has been more than \$1.6 billion value in public and private investment since 2011 alone. Even prior to that, Devon Energy began work in 2009 on its \$750 million headquarters downtown.

The OKC Chamber reports private property values within the three-block impact zone have grown by 115 percent since the route was proposed in 2011. Because of its location along the streetcar route, Heartland chose Automobile Alley to build its 7-story, 110,000 square-foot headquarters. Tony Capucille, president of Heartland, cited the streetcar at the building's front door, and the vibrant energy downtown as the reason for building and bringing nearly 1,000 employees downtown.
